Joint Forces must end Military Presence in Zamzam Camp

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The undersigned organizations once again express their profound concern about the unbearable suffering of civilians in Sudan due to the ongoing fighting between the Sudanese Armed Forces (SAF) and its allied armed groups on the one hand, and the Rapid Support Forces (RSF) on the other. Massive mobilization of civilians and armament of likely volunteer fighters, with light and heavy weapons, fuel the fighting further and provides the waring parties with additional pretexts to consider civilian areas as military targets.

We draw attention to the dramatic development in Zamzam Camp, which is one of the largest gathering points of internally displaced persons (IDPs) in Darfur. The densely populated camp is located at about 15km south of El Fasher, North Darfur State. Reports indicated that the Joint Forces – a coalition of former insurgent groups from Darfur that supports SAF's war efforts – is increasing its military presence in Zamzam Camp. A statement issued by the Coordination of IDPs in Zamzam Camp indicated that on 12th and 13th November 2024, the Joint Forces have deployed tanks, military vehicles, drones as well as middle range and heavy weapons in the Camp. They have installed Starlink satellite devices and started building military checkpoints and digging trenches for combat purpose.

The use of IDP camps for military purpose exposes civilians and non-combatants to the dangers of military operations and retaliation from the belligerent parties. Such practice puts the IDPs, the most vulnerable civilians, at the risk of violations of article 3 which is common to the 4 Geneva Conventions of 1949 and Protocol II applicable to the protection of civilians and non-combatants during armed conflicts not of an international character.

It is unacceptable that all efforts for ceasefire for humanitarian purposes failed due to the intransigence of SAF and its refusal to engage with the international community in the ceasefire talks convened in Geneva (Switzerland) last summer. In this respect, we recall relevant resolutions adopted by the African Union's Peace and Security Council (AUPSC) and the UN Security Council, notably Communiqué (PSC/HoSG/COMM.1218(2024) adopted by AUPSC at the level of Heads of State and Government on 21 June 2024 as well as resolution (S/RES/2736(2024), which expressed concerns over RSF's siege over El Fasher and called on SAF and the RSF to de-escalation and agree on immediate cessation of hostilities, leading to sustainable resolution to the armed conflict through dialogue.

We recommend that:

- The waring parties refrain from deploying troops and military equipment in Zamzam Camp and end military presence in the IDPs settlements all over Darfur.
- 2. The warning parties should put immediate halt to all military operations notably the use of heavy artillery and aerial bombardment in civilian areas and that they fully engage in a transparent discussion on matters of protection of civilians.
- 3. The African Union should take the lead in guiding the international community in its efforts to protect civilians in Sudan and to force the warning parties to reach a negotiated settlement of this devastating armed conflict.
